Dear Mr. Millar:

Pursuant to our telephone conversation, here is the covering letter you requested in regard to the art work I have been commissioned to execute for the Ford Pavilion in New York.

The work consists of sculptured trees and decorative wall panels as follows:

- 1) Sculptured Trees: Brass & bronze highly polished, using some small brass automobile parts (gears, nuts, etc.) to enhance the design elements of the trees. Acetylene welding will be used to make 3-dimensional trees approximately 4 1/2' to 5' high. Cost: \$500 each.
- 2) Interior Wall Panels: Ford vinyl seat covers cut out and machine sewn in a collage technique to depict the four seasons. (Panels of trees in different colors & design for each season.) Each panel will be approximately 9' X 19'. Cost: \$1070 each.


The above work is to be shipped by Welton Beckett in New York about the 1st of March 1965 and they are also to install them.

Mr. J. McQuad of Welton Beckett has advised me that I am to be furnished the vinyl for the wall panels courtesy of the Ford Motor Company. Therefore I would appreciate it if you could arrange to have samples of all colors and textures sent to me as soon as possible so that I can start to work on the commission immediately.

Total cost of the art work is \$3,140. The customary deposit of 50% is due at this time.

The remaining \$1,570 is payable on my delivery of the work to Welton Beckett.
