Lotus-Ford That Won Indianapolis 500 Miler

NEW YORK, N. Y., June 14. — The Ford powered Lotus car in which Scotsman Jimmy Clark won the Indianapolis 500-mile race May 31, was put on display here today at the World's Fair.

Mr. Clark and Colin Chapman, president of Lotus Cars, Limited of England, were on hand here as the No. 92 Lotus was placed on exhibit at the Ford Pavilion.

Ford Motor Company purchased the car following the race in which Clark established a record average speed of 150.686 mph for the 500 miles. It was the first "500" victory by a Ford-powered or rear engine car.

Donald N. Frey, Ford vice-president and Ford Division general manager, noted that this year's race was both the safest and fastest in Indianapolis 500 history.

"Jimmy has to get most of the credit for making it the fastest in history," he said. "But it's to everyone's credit — the drivers, the crews, the manufacturers,

year's 500 was also the safest on record."

Mr. Frey confirmed that Ford will have an engine at Indianapolis, again in 1966. He said he expects an arrangement similar to the one this year in which Ford produced the engine and retained an independent firm to sell and service it.

Manny Stops Cabana At Catamount Stocks
